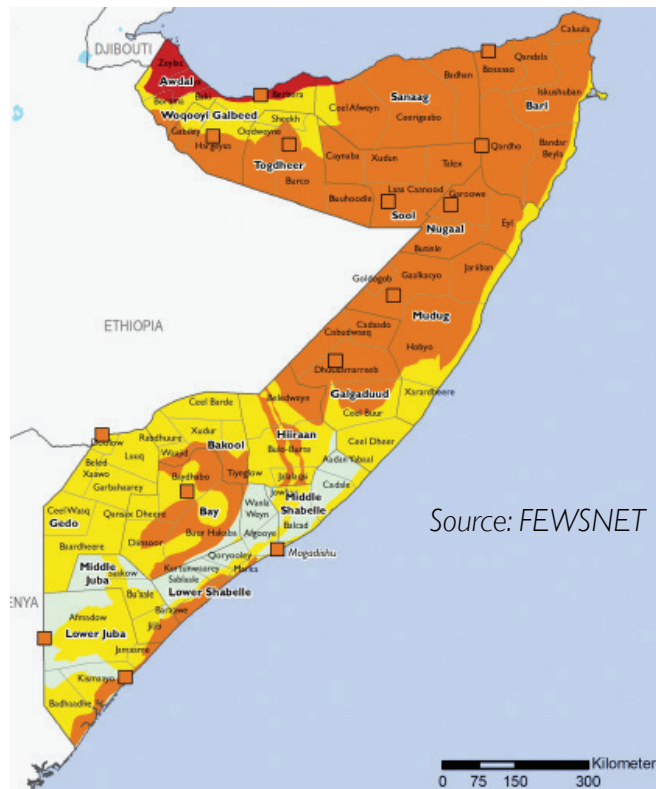


Key messages

- Overall situation:** Heavy rains have been experienced in Somalia. The Ethiopian highlands where the river Juba and Shabelle originate, have experienced high water levels resulting in flooding in Banadir region, Jowhar in Hirshabelle and Ceel Cade, Jamame in Jubaland and some locations in South West State. 547,000 people have been affected, of whom 369,000 are displaced in the southern areas. In the north, coastal areas of Bari and Nugaal regions are affected.
- The rains and flooding have destroyed infrastructure and livelihoods. The community infrastructures such as houses, irrigation canals and roads are damaged. Livestock has been lost and agricultural production has been decimated. More than 10,000 hectares of crop land has been damaged. Latrines have also been destroyed resulting in an increased risk of water borne diseases.
- The federal government has constituted a task force that is supporting the humanitarian partners in coordination of the response. The humanitarian partners and local authorities have scaled up response to the flood affected communities.
- Food security:** The country was already ravaged by drought prior to the floods and the displaced people, mothers and children are now facing serious hunger risks especially in areas receiving little humanitarian assistance due to inaccessibility.
- Malnutrition:** With the onset of the floods, more than a million children under-5 years are projected to be acutely malnourished.

October 2019 - January 2020

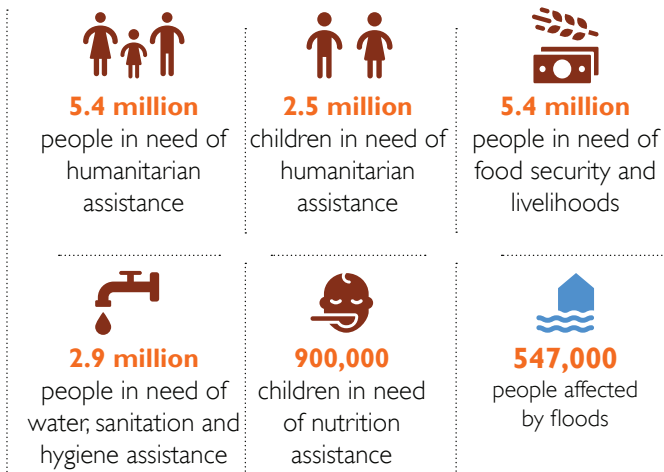


1: Minimal 2: Stressed 3: Crisis 4: Emergency 5: Famine

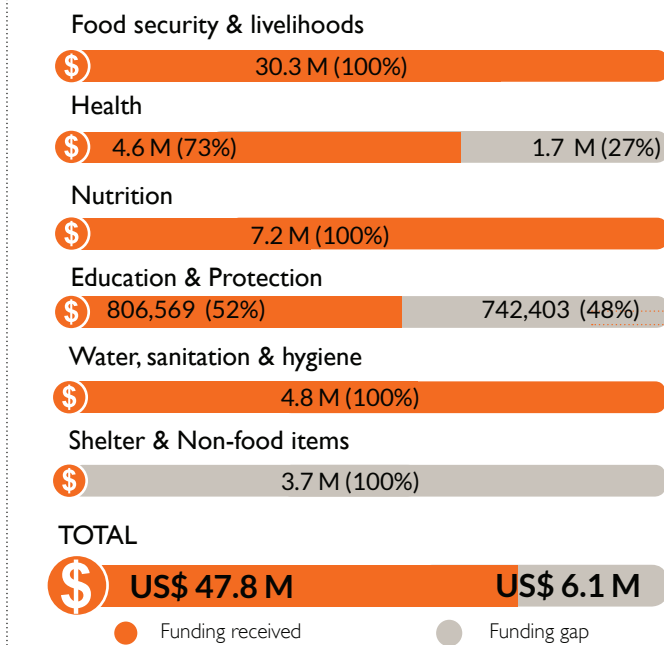
Gaps and needs

- Significant gaps with regard to emergency shelter, non-food items (NFIs), food, safe drinking water, latrines, rehabilitation of shallow wells, mosquito and vector control, nutrition, mobile health supplies and medicine are reported. A multi-sectoral response to the drought impact and floods is required. Without adequate and timely funding, World Vision will not be able to respond to these needs.

Response highlights



WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

- 27,438 people and 14,260 children benefited from various WASH activities in South West State, Jubaland, Puntland & Somaliland.
- In South West state, under GAC Project, distributed 1,500 sets of WASH NFIs to 2,745 individuals, water trucking benefitted 10 IDPs sites in Baidoa (6,000 individuals). 120 VIP latrines were constructed in 10 IDPs sites in Baidoa serving 4,716 individuals (1,634W, 679M, 1,384G and 1,010B).
- Rehabilitation 6 Shallow wells was finalized benefiting 3,000 individuals.



HEALTH

- 42,835 people (21,816 children) received various health services (out-patient, antenatal, immunization, health education and mobile clinic).
- 7,524 individuals benefited from treatment in WV supported primary health care units. 2,583 pregnant women from IDPs and host communities benefited from ANC services.
- In Puntland, 10,375 people including 4,534 under 5 years' children and 5,841 above 5 years accessed out-patient treatment at 15 health Centres and 4 mobile clinics whilst 5,594 children were immunized.
- In Somaliland 27 health facilities managed by World Vision and 10 mobile teams reached 5,168 individuals of whom 2,934 were children.



EDUCATION

- 1,095 individuals including 993 children benefited from education interventions in Somaliland and Puntland.
- In Puntland, 102 teachers (78M, 24F) were supported with incentives aimed at keeping teachers in school and promoting learning among students as well as improve on the quality of education. Separately construction of 6 classrooms, 3 staff rooms, 3 stores, 3 twin latrines in 3 schools (Cambare, Aftogweyne and Weylaliq) was completed and hand over is planned to take place in Nov 2019.
- Education sessions on FGM, child marriage and Fistula were conducted in Somaliland in Caqil yare Koosar, & Ali Hussein IDPs benefitting a total of 310 children (140G, 70B).



FOOD SECURITY & LIVELIHOODS

- FSL interventions reached 175,521 people & 70,740 children in South West State, Jubaland, Puntland and Somaliland. Food Vouchers; reached 70,308 beneficiaries in Somaliland. 9,738 beneficiaries were reached through livelihood trainings.
- Cash and Voucher Programming (CVP): Cumulative savings of \$305,480 recorded under 135 Savings for transformation (S4T) groups with 2,835 members. In Jubaland and south West state, 6,241 individuals redeemed over \$227,500 through unconditional food vouchers and 4,250 individuals redeemed \$217,725 in conditional cash transfers. In Puntland, cash value of \$117,260 was injected into the local market through E-Vouchers enabling 1,804 households (10,824 individuals) to access food commodities of up to \$65 dollars per household.



NUTRITION

- 31,915 people and 19,670 children were treated of Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM) in South West State, Somaliland and Puntland.
- In Jubaland and South West State, 3,547 children and 234 PLW were screened by Community Health Workers (CHWs), 348 MAM and 7 SAM cases were admitted.
- 1,069 children were discharged as cured under Targeted Supplementary Feeding programme (TSFP). Additionally, 666 of malnourished (PLW) were treated and 317 of them cured and discharged.

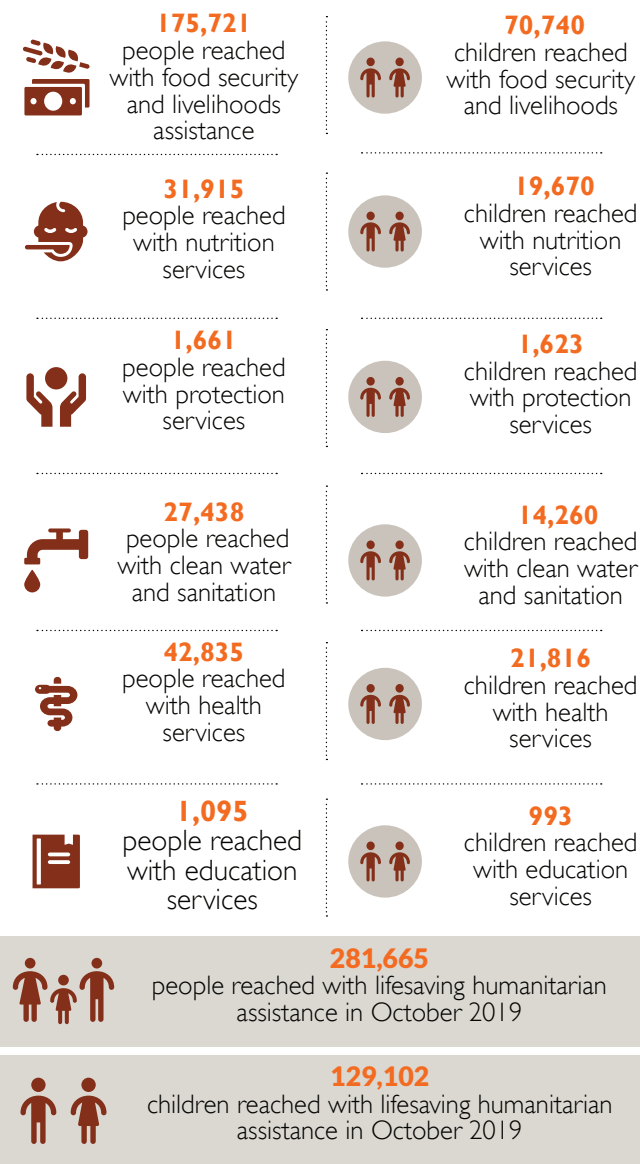


PROTECTION

- 1,661 people including 1,623 children benefited from protection interventions in Puntland and Somaliland.
- 18 nurses (5M, 13F) and other health care providers participated in the GBV referral pathway training. Additionally, FGM policy dissemination workshop was conducted for 20 Sheikhs. Further, a total of 623 individuals were reached through awareness creation and messaging sessions on FGM, Child protection, child rights and Fistula in different locations. Additionally, ten women were supported with medical fees for fistula.

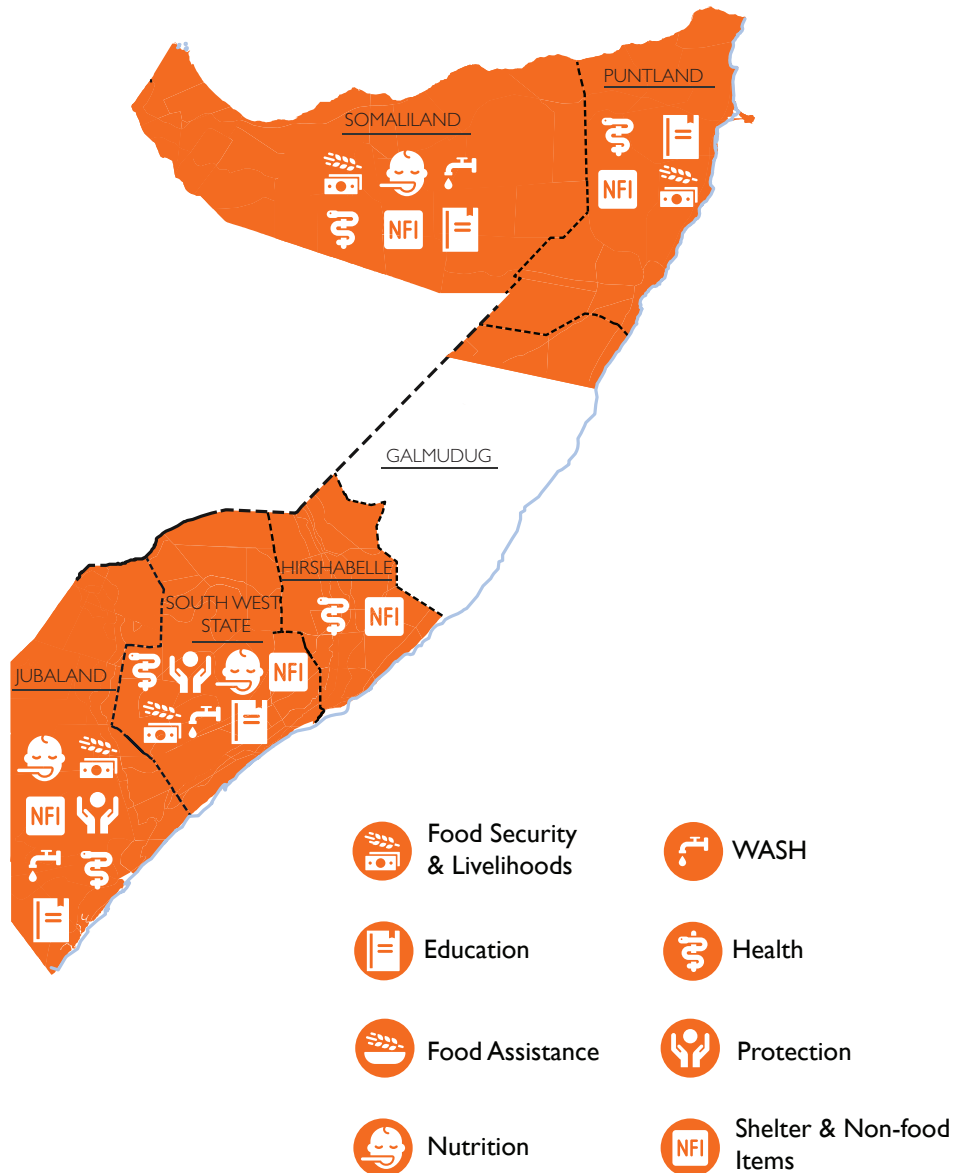
